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President's Report

To start my report this time I must send a great big thank you and my congratulations to our Commemorative Association in Victoria for a job well done in hosting their first biennial convention. Outside of a few glitches with hotel rooms that were solved by Murray Doull in a timely manner, we were looked after very well. There were 47 HK veterans registered and the time was very enjoyable renewing old acquaintances and meeting some of the family members.

The National Executive Council of the Hong Kong Veterans' Association met for a couple of hours prior to the meeting of our Commemorative Executive Council. I asked for and received permission to continue investigating the concept of a monument to honour all members of "C" Force. The parameters are:

a) to determine the focus of the Memorial as desired by the HKVA membership - strictly military presentation - to include the historical aspect - to give individual recognition, etc.

b) to seek alternative designs and potential locations

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c) to prepare a feasibility report on the most choice options

We will continue discussions with the Thomas Sills Foundation and the Intrepid Society in Winnipeg to see what develops and report back to the Executive council.

Another motion from our Executive Council was to reject the Royal Canadian Legion's "Call to Unity" on the proposed widow's VIP legislation. Cliff Chadderton submitted a proposal to benefit the widows but the wording was changed. By a unanimous vote, the motion to reject the changed proposal and a letter will be sent to Cliff to support him in reinstating the original proposal. We feel that the legislation should include all widows, present and future, when the husband had been receiving VIP assistance at the time of his passing. So now we will have to wait and hopefully the proposal will be amended in our favour before it goes to vote.

This will be a very busy weekend with a variety of activities scheduled:

- Thursday evening, September 18th, Juliet and I will attend an invitational viewing of the Manitoba Museum prior to the official opening on Saturday.
- On Friday I will be attending the dedication of the statue "Winged Victory" at Deer Lodge. This is the statue that in 1922 was placed at the CP rail depot on Higgins as a memorial to the CP personal that served in World War I and II and the Korean War.
- Saturday is the Commemorative meeting at St. James Legion
- Sunday I hope to attend the "Salute to Veterans" that will be performed by the various cadet corps units of Winnipeg at the Cenotaph on Memorial Boulevard.

Ooops! After typing the previous paragraph I decided to move my computer and unplugged it. When the move was completed and reconnected, it didn't work. So I tried everything that I knew which wasn't much and finally gave up in disgust. When my daughter came over to fix things for me, she found that the plug wasn't in all the way and I failed to see that. I had thought everything was lost again but it seems ok except for the fact that my computer was out of commission for 5 days.

As it turned out, I was unable to go to the Museum. Juliet told me that it was probably for the best as she had to walk a long distance and I would not have made it. I attended the rededication at Deer Lodge and it was a very stirring experience. I also attended the Commemorative meeting where I received a better understanding of the charitable license that we now have. Today I went to the Cenotaph only to learn they had moved the ceremony inside the Legislature building because of the threat of rain. So I rode the bus to Broadway Avenue and was able to arrive inside on time. This service was also a novel experience – especially when it was over. I cannot remember being saluted so often and asked so many questions about my military service and how we coped as unwilling guests of the Imperial Japanese Empire.

We have another meeting to attend Thursday September 25th then I hope to go to the cottage for some Perch fishing for a couple of days. Don't forget our Annual Dinner on October 25th – please order your tickets now as we want to see you there.

To all who have been under the weather, we wish you a full and speedy recovery. To everyone we wish a smooth road to travel and may the wind always be at your back.

Greetings to all members and friends of Hong Kong Veterans' Commemorative Association. I trust you had a good summer and are now ready to face another glorious Canadian winter.

First, a few notes on various items we have for sale through "Barry's Emporium". As pointed out in the last issue, we ask that you make out your cheques to "HKVCA". We would also like you to include the mailing cost in your payment. This, of course will vary, but if you add a couple of bucks for most items, that should be sufficient.

We recently had more copies made of the Winnipeg Grenadier Honour Roll but like everything else, that cost has increased in recent times. We are now charging \$20.00 apiece and that will cover the cost of the mailing tube. Another addition to the Emporium in the near future will be a desk top flag set, consisting of a 4" X 6" Hong Kong Vets flag plus a Canadian flag of the same size. More on this in the next newsletter.

If you are interested in numbers, you will be pleased to know that the Manitoba Region of the HKVCA has 202 dues paying members. In addition to this, we also have included in our membership 59 veterans and 98 widows. The vets and widows are not charged for dues, but many of you have been very generous in making donations to the organization each year.

We also have a number of tardy folks who sit on their wallets or use their chequebooks for doorstops or whatever. I'm afraid to say that there are still 31 members who have not sent us their 2003 dues and of those, 18 are two years behind in payment

while almost a dozen owe for three years. If you receive an envelope addressed to HKVCA along with this letter, that means you owe for at least this year. We would really like to clean this up and hopefully we will hear from most of you before year-end. I'm afraid that those who still owe for more than two years will be dropped from our mailing list.

The convention in Victoria was lots of fun and it also proved to be another opportunity to peddle some of our merchandise. We were able to set up shop in one of the hotel rooms and while not being able to stick to any kind of a schedule due to the convention activities, Connie and I were able to sell almost \$600 worth of shirts, pins and honour rolls. Thanks to the generosity of a local trucking company, it only cost us \$15 to ship all our wares to Victoria.

Thanks to the magic of the Internet, dozens of photographs of the convention have been made available to all. Allan Hadley (MB) and Murray Doull (BC) were most diligent in taking pictures of all the events and they have sent many of us copies. I was particularly proud to see the 46 Veterans who attended the convention, all seated at the cenotaph for the Memorial Service. That event truly moved me and was the highlight of my trip to Victoria.

The summer did not bring forth much membership activity, but I did drop by to see **Bev Adams** here in **Winnipeg**, as she wanted to donate a scrapbook on the HK Vets to our archives. We will be pleased to accept any of your HK mementos, as we will hopefully have display venues in place later this year. We also have space in a storage facility although it's not our first choice to put things away where they might get forgotten. I also just heard from **Verna Pearson** in **New Brunswick** and she tells me I am the lucky winner of a beautiful quilt she made and raffled off as a fundraiser. More on that after I have received the quilt and had a chance to show it off.

The Memory Project

The Memory Project is division of the Dominion Institute that has focused its efforts on conducting original research into Canadians' knowledge of the country's past and building innovative programs that broaden appreciation of the richness and complexity of the Canadian story.

The Veterans' Archive is a feature of The Memory Project that allows users to search through an online database containing stories about thousands of Canadians whose lives were touched by war. From the D-Day landings to what it is like to serve as a peacekeeper, the Veterans' Archive provides gripping, first-hand accounts of the defining moments of 20th century Canadian history.

The Veterans' Archive also provides students and veterans with the opportunity to

become digital historians and preserve Canada's military history for future generations. In addition to those that served overseas, the Dominion Institute is looking for stories about the Great Depression, life on the home front, the Cold War and Canada's contributions to international peacekeeping.
