Bill served on many veterans' committees in Winnipeg and I for one feel that this recognition was well earned. The Joint Veterans have also requested the Province of Manitoba to honour Bill with membership to the Order of Manitoba.

The Prairie Region of DVA have made the decision to form what is to be known as the Prairie Advisory Council. This Council is to include a member representative from each of the veterans' associations in the Prairie provinces. One meeting is planned to be held in alternating capitals of the provinces each year. The inaugral meeting is taking place March 20th in Regina, SK. The next year the

meeting will be in either Calgary or Winnipeg. I was unable to attend this year but expect to receive all pertinent information on this. The main purpose of the council is for the veterans to provide input as to how DVA can best serve the needs of the veterans.

Bill Maltman is home from the hospital and much happier now. He has a new setup for his oxygen supply which allows him more freedom to move around. Roy Robinson, I am pleased to tell you, also arrived home from the hospital March 21st. I plan on seeing him soon as Roy and Shirley live within my limited driving distance.

National President, Harry Atkinson



Harry Atkinson, who died March 2, 2002 at age 80 after a battle with lung cancer, was a tireless fighter for the rights of Canada's Hong Kong veterans.

Harry was a founding member of our Branch, but it was when he took early retirement that he took up a more active role in our

association. Before he retired Harry was appointed official branch pensions officer. As a development representative for Robinson Little Lighting Co., he travelled to many parts of the province. During these travels he met with a lot of our comrades. Harry was very approachable if you had a problem and he would seek an answer for you if he was unable to supply one.

Harry became the National President and the National Pensions Officer. Roger Cyr took over from Harry as National President but Harry retained the pensions office until the War Amps offered their assistance. When Roger's health prevented him from carrying on as President, then Harry stepped into the job and remained there until his demise.

At the Convention in 2001, Ron Duhamel, Veteran's Affairs Minister, announced the Hong Kong Veterans' pensions would be increased to 100% and commended Harry's efforts in this matter.

Museum Project

The Manitoba Museum of Man and Nature has expressed its interest in putting together a permanent display of Hong Kong Veterans' memorabilia. The Museum is also offering to "archive" our historical documentation ie. letters, newspaper clippings, things such as badges, medals, old items a Veteran may have brought home with him such as a gun or a piece of clothing etc. This means, in addition to a permanent display, the Museum is willing to properly store our historical information, at the correct temperature, under ideal conditions for preservation. Harry Atkinson stated recently that "it's about time" when I told him of the Museum's intent to have a permanent display dedicated to the Hong Kong Veterans.

The items which we wish to forward to the Manitoba Museum of Man and Nature need to be catalogued. The Commemorative is taking on this task and I am heading up the committee to gather, document, itemize - all the things required in cataloguing. We ask you, the Hong Kong family, to take stock of the historical information that your family has been saving and see if there is information that you are willing to donate to the Museum. Of course, there will be personal items such as letters and telegrams that you may not wish to part with and that's just fine.

Whatever you feel may compliment our goal of presenting the Hong Kong Veterans of Canada to the Museum for display/archiving will be greatly appreciated. You may find newspaper articles pertaining to your family Veteran, in particular. These articles may be hard to duplicate as, I know in my family, we have saved articles that featured our Dad. Therefore, even if you do not want to part with an article, you may wish to give us permission to copy it. We want to get as overall a picture as we possibly can. This is a great opportunity that we all need to take advantage of before the information is no longer available. Please sort out your information and give me a call. If you would like help going through your keepsakes I, or another Commemorative member, will come over and help you.
