Hong Kong War Diary

Often I will visit the web site of hongkongwardiary.com belonging to Tony Benham of Hong Kong. I and my family were fortunate to meet with Tony on the last Pilgrimage. We learned of his avid interest in the Battle of Hong Kong and he took the opportunity to interview several of the veterans that were on the Pilgrimage.

His book "Hong Kong War Diary" will be published this coming year and ready for distribution in the fall of 2002. I have made inquiries as to receiving notification when the book is ready and the cost to let everyone know.

Here is an excerpt from his web site:

"Hong Kong Today

Many people are surprised that so much of the conflict remain visible today, so I like to occasionally post recent 'finds' here. Figure 1 Japanese type 89 mortar fuse from Jardine's Lookout

> May 1st 2001: Five Japanese rifle cartridges on Jardine's Lookout. May 23rd 2001: A live Japanese Type 94 mortar bomb a meter under the surface in Causeway Bay.

July 22nd, 2001: One live Japanese rifle round, and one spent cartridge.

Aug 24th 2001: Two live 6.5mm rounds, one fuse (illustrated) and one spent 6.5 cartridge. Oct 2nd 2001: A smashed .303 round, a (probable) Japanese 7.7mm bullet, and a large piece of shrapnel all from a Winnipeg Grenadier position on top of

Jardines Lookout."

We look forward to seeing Tony's book to learn of more of the events of the Battle of Hong Kong.

C.O.F.E.P.O.W

This acronym stands for Children (and Families) of Far East Prisoners of War and Carol Cooper is the Director of this group. She has a wonderful web site located at <u>www.cofepow.org.uk.</u>

Here is one of the events that occured in their Association:

"VISIT TO THE NATIONAL MEMORIAL ARBORETUM, STAFFS

The 15th February 2002 will be the 60th Anniversary of the fall of Singapore, which in truth was the beginning of the end for a great many of those who were taken prisoner.



To mark this occasion, COFEPOW will be holding a Remembrance Service in the small newly built Chapel at the Arboretum. The Director of the Arboretum, Commander David Childs will conduct the Service. Following this, we will proceed to the site where our COFEPOW building is going to stand and a small ceremony will take place as we erect a wooden cross, bearing a poppy wreath, After our building is completed, it is intended that this cross will then become one of the focal points inside.

Part of the original Burma railway should be in place by that date and it is hoped to dedicate this at the same time.

This beautiful small Chapel has a limited seating capacity of 120, plus we will be inviting other guests and associations."

Miscellaneous Items

Through the internet, I have received a request from a new COFEPOW member, whose Father was captured and imprisoned by the Japanese during the Second World War. Her name is Jenny Watts, and her Father's name was Lance Bombardier Charles Arthur Alexander of the Royal Artillery, captured in Hong Kong on Christmas Eve 1941 and released in November 1945. Apart from finding out recently that he was held somewhere near Tokyo, she doesn't know any more, and her Father died 15 years ago in 1986. She believes he knew many Canadian servicemen in captivity, several of which her Mother has old photographs of. Last Sunday she was able to take part in the Royal British Legion Remembrance Day Parade in Whitehall, London as part of COFEPOW. It was a very emotional experience for all the members who took part in remembering their Dads, Brothers, She would welcome hearing from Uncles etc. anyone that might have known her Father.

**An initiative has begun to increase awareness of the Asian theatre of war in WWII. This was started in British Columbia last September in the Senior 1 History Curriculum with the syllabus called "Human Rights in the Asia Pacific 1931- 1945". There was input from two of our HK vets, Lionel Speller and Don McPherson.

Derrill Henderson has made contact with the BC Department of Education to receive copies of this document for distribution to the HKVCA Regions, with the hope of soliciting its use in all schools across Canada. This will ensure that the Battle of Hong Kong and its subsequent issues will never be forgotten.**

If you have been to the HKVCA web site, you will see a place for suggested reading. There are a list of books that will give you information on the Battle of Hong Kong. The books that I like to read about the Battle, are the ones written by the veterans. However many of them have been published privately and with limited numbers. If it was possible I would like to see each Region gather some of these books for the members to use as resource. I have another request from a COFEPOW member whose name is Mrs. Pam Broadhead. She omitted to give me her Father's name but he was a POW in Shamshiupo and Omine Japan. He served with the 22nd Fortress Company Royal Engineers in Hong Kong. He kept a notebook in which he recorded briefly his imprisonment and journey home. In the back of the book he had a list of fellow FEPOWS most of whom were Canadians. She has been trying to track these men down through the Central Government and the Visual Archives of Canada, with no luck.
