The display of Hong Kong artefacts in our Mayor's office foyer was well received by both the general public and the media alike. Although people who were in attendance for the placing of the display were few, we were told that a lot of interest was shown during the time it was in the foyer. These artefacts will eventually be turned over to the Manitoba Museum for safekeeping and will also be shown from time to time.

The interviews that were filmed during our convention in Winnipeg in August 2001 were finally shown on the History channel on November 13th last year, under the title "Turning Points of History, Slaves of the Rising Sun". This episode is supposed to be aired again but we were not given the exact date. In November last year I received a package from Phil Doddridge, our National President via Derrill Henderson that contained five of the Queen's Golden Jubilee Medals that were awarded to Carol Hadley, Lora Wachtendorf, Bob Lytle, Bill Maltman and the fifth medal posthumously for Bert Delbridge. It was my honour to present these

medals to the well deserving recipients at our monthly luncheon meeting in December. Bert's daughter Linda accepted the award. I understand this medal was also awarded posthumously to Harry Atkinson and was presented to his daughter, Lori Smith, at a ceremony that took place earlier in Toronto. I believe it was Phil who made the nominations for these people to receive these medals. I was also asked to attend a ceremony held in Transcona on December 15th in which their Member of Parliament, the Honourable Mr Bill Blaikie, honoured three members of our colour party with this award. One of the necessary qualifications to receive this award states "the recipient had made significant contribution to Canada or to a particular province, territory, region or a community within Canada or have made an outstanding achievement abroad that brings credit to Canada". I believe each of these people has done that and I congratulate them whole-heartedly and thank them for a job well done.

The second meeting of the DVA Prairie Regional Advisory Council was held at DVA headquarters in Winnipeg on December 4th with approximately 40 people in attendance from all 3 Prairie Provinces. It was a good meeting with a lot of discussion on how DVA could better serve the needs of our aging veterans; another topic was the preparation and the serving of food in the various hospitals and nursing homes, where some of our veterans are now living. Their trays are checked as to the quantity of food they consume daily and if any food is uneaten the veteran is asked why, is it because there was too much or was it not suitable to their taste, etc. All subjects that were discussed will again be brought up at the next meeting to be held in Calgary Alberta some time in March of this year. I haven't quite decided if I will attend but I'm seriously thinking about it.

Carol Hadley & Juliet Lafortune looked after placing our wreath at the Remembrance Day service in Winnipeg & our colour Party also participate in the service at the Convention Centre. They all deserve a big thank you for their performance. I did attend the service but did not play an active role this year. I was asked to be the guest speaker at the Remembrance Day service held at Churchill High School in Winnipeg on November 8th, which I was very pleased to accept. Unfortunately the time allotted to me was very short, so I made a promise to return at a later date to talk to the students.


Annual Dinner



Miscellaneous Items

- Many months ago I was contacted by friend, Tony Banham, in Hong Kong, informing me that the 3 plaques that were dedicated to our veterans at the 2000 Pilgrimage had not been put in their proper place yet and the dedicated site where John Osborn died was still not finished.

Through our National Executive, the Government of Canada was asked to look into this. While the Government was looking into the matter, I received a note from a former Winnipegger, Doug Nairne who is a Deputy Editor for the South China Morning Post, a newspaper in Hong Kong. He offered his assistance and the power of the press to try and move the governments to complete the projects. Mr. Nairne's article, admonishing both governments in their tardiness to complete these projects, was picked up by the Globe and Mail and ran in their October 15^{th} , 2002 edition in Canada.

In the meantime a representative, of the Canadian Consulate in Hong Kong, sent the explanation that with the new Cabinet system that they have in place, not all responsibilities have been allocated. There have been delays in the land transfers for the historical sites to be established. Also there has been a large turnover of staff in the Antiquities and Monuments office to add to the delays.

The Consulate assured us that they are very committed to this and understand how important this recognition is to the veterans and their families. They are monitoring the situation very closely and will continue to raise the issue at the highest levels until they get results. They understand that the delays may be upsetting to the vets- and have asked us to reassure everyone that they will work at this until they are completed.

Hopefully we will have good news in the New Year that the projects are complete. We'll let you know and possibly have pictures to show you.

Back in August, I received an email from a man in Ireland who was searching the internet to find information on Pte. Komorsky (nickname Komo), HKVDC only to find in one of our 1999 newsletters that he had died. He explained that his mother's adopted brother, Barney kept a diary while he was a POW in Hong Kong. 'Komo' and his mother (Zenis) lived in Hong Kong when the war broke out. When Komo and Barney were interred together, Zenis was able to get small packages of food to them to keep them going. This generosity and sacrifice helped to save both the men's lives. Our Irishman was looking for more information about his uncle Barney and hoped that by contacting Komo's family he might learn more. Through inquiries in Hong Kong, I learned that Komo's widow lived in BC. Our BC members sent her address and I have given Mrs. Komorsky the contact in Ireland.

It is so exciting to unite people this way and Mrs. Komorsky has promised to let me know the results of their communication.

Our website is so important for many families who are trying to find family or friends that may have been lost in the war or just lost track of over the years. They use the site to link to us in an attempt to fill the gap so they have closure to their loss of family or friends. This is why it is important for the veteran's stories to be captured in print before they are lost and an important part of Canadian History is gone.

An example of a specific search is this -- a grand nephew of **Private CLIFFORD MARSH**, H/41672, who died on Saturday 12 February 1944 in Japan. Does anyone have any information for the family on his time as a POW or how he died?

Then there is Russ from Ontario who is trying to find an old girlfriend from grade 3 and her father was possibly in Hong Kong and his name was Burkett. The only record that could be found was a Brit from the Middlesex unit. Oh well, we aim to help everyone. It was cute anyway.

Rick Bullock is looking for info, pictures etc., on the Sham Shui Po P.O.W. camp. His late grandfather, **Thomas Ward** was in this camp, he was with the Grenadiers. His grandfather was Thomas L. Ward, H 6649 and if anyone has information about Thomas Ward as a POW please let me know. He writes: "Thomas Lawrence Ward was my grandfather, he passed away in 1965, I was only 8 at the time. My Mother (Thomas's daughter), said he never talked about it much only to say that he remembers **Sgt. Fred Able** giving his rations to some of the more needy P.O.Ws. Sgt. Able died in camp of dysentery; any info on Sgt.Able would be of interest to me also. He was married to my great Aunt Eva who never remarried, she resides in Winnipeg. The little pieces of info are very interesting and my Mother is very grateful for the help I am getting to recover these tidbits."

Member Update:

(Editor: I received this beautiful tribute from John, as many of us couldn't be there to honour Ethel and give him support. He asked me to share this with you.)

Ethel Cake - Eulogy by John Pollock

I first met Ethel at a Valentine's Dance at the Y.M.C.A in Toronto on February 14, 1975. I asked her for a date for the next Saturday, she accepted and that is how our friendship started. We went for a lobster dinner, then dancing and we danced very well together. For the next 27 years we traveled the world together, mostly by ourselves.

Ethel was a widow and traveled by herself to Russia, Germany, Peru and Cuba. She had the experience that I didn't have but I soon learned.

The same year that I met her, she mentioned going to Hong Kong. I told her that I was a Hong Kong veteran and a former Prisoner of War (PoW). That August, our trip took us to Hong Kong, Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia, Singapore and we met some very nice people. When we got home we decided to plan our next trip and to go to Mexico for the winters.

We went on Mediterranean cruises over the years. One trip took us to Rome and Greece. The second trip took us to Port Said where we travelled by bus through the hot desert for 5 hours to Cairo, where we had our picture taken on a camel. When we got back on the bus to go to the hotel, we discovered that we didn't smell that good and had to go to the back of the bus. We stayed at the Holiday Inn where we went immediately to our rooms to shower before we went for a buffet dinner and a bottle of red wine.

We went to different parts of Mexico. Our first stop was Acapulco, next year Cancun, then **Puerto Vallarta**, where we stayed most of the time. We would go in March or April and there were good bargains.

We went to Conventions and reunions in Winnipeg where Ethel got to be well liked by the people there, especially Lionel Speller.

Ethel and I went to western dances mostly in the winter and took a mickey of scotch. B.Y.O.B. We both drank scotch over the years until her doctor said she had to quit, so 3 years ago we both quit.

The last 3 years I noticed a change in Ethel's habits and memory, her family said they knew 5 years ago. Every time Ethel had an appointment with her doctors, her daughter asked me to take her,

so she didn't have to lose time at her job. So I took her to the hospital for her appointments.

Ethel was an accountant over the years and she was 78 when she died. I will miss her after 27 years. On our anniversary on February 14 we would go to an expensive restaurant. The last 2 years I gave her a dozen red roses.

Ethel passed away October 14, 2002 at 8 a.m. Thanksgiving Day, she had Alzheimer's disease. Carol there is a lot more but no more. -John
