The outstanding bravery of servicemen and women who have sustained wounds or injury in the line of duty is now recognised with the striking of the 'Hors de Combat' commemorative medal.

The medal is a befitting way to recognise and pay tribute to the sacrifices and suffering incurred by service personnel throughout the world in the service of their country.

** Ferdinand the Bull

As promised, here is the followup on Ferdinand.

Gord Crossley of the Fort Garry Horse, provided us with this information: Ferdinand was made by Chiltern Hygienic Toys in England, famous for their line of "Hugmee" teddy bears. He has sent out some emails to toy collector organizations on the web to find out Ferdinand would have been quite new in 1941. The book that his character was based on was written in 1936, and the Disney film and books came out in 1938. Here is some interesting information on the author of the book.

"MUNRO LEAF, author and illustrator of dozens of children's books, is best remembered for his signature character, Ferdinand, the Spanish bull who preferred smelling flowers to fighting in a ring in Spain.

One Sunday afternoon in 1935, Leaf decided to write a children's story so that his close friend Robert Lawson (a relatively unknown illustrator) could show his talents. In less than one hour, Leaf composed the beloved 800-word story as it stands today, nearly 60 years later.

When published by Viking in 1936 as The Story of Ferdinand, the book sparked controversy. With the Spanish Civil War waging, political critics charged it was a satirical attack on aggression. In Germany, Hitler order the book burned while fellow dictator Stalin granted it privileged status as

the only non-communist children's book allowed in Poland. And India's spiritual leader Ghandi called it his favourite book. In spite of the notoriety, the nation embraced the peaceable bull."

- Now the **questions** that we have are: Where did "Sailor" Morgan get the stuffed bull, when did he get it and from whom? The rumour of the crystal radio in the bull was proven false after having the bull x-rayed and it doesn't look like any alterations to the toy has occurred. But was the story a coverup or something to give the men hope? Even the original "Chiltern" label is in tack. We have tried several emails to try and find out further information but to date, we have had no luck. If anyone has input into this story, or knows how we could reach any of "Sailor's" family, please let me know.
