HKVA 'C' Force Interpretative Centre

The HKVA Memorial Project Committee is continuing to work on the establishment of the 'C' Force Interpretative Centre. The project is in a pause for two reasons. One reason is the acquisition of land for the centre at Brookside Cemetery. This matter is still being negotiated with the City of Winnipeg who owns the land and the committee. The second reason is fund raising for

the project has not been successful as was hoped. Because this avenue has not been successful, the committee exploring other alternatives to raise the awareness of 'C' Force with the general public.

As interim to the establishment of the 'C' Force Interpretative Centre, the committee has started communication with the Western Canada Aviation Museum to erect a 'C' Force display at their new location. This new location will be in the present Winnipeg Airport Terminal. This display would become part of the museum. The Western Canada Aviation Museum will be located in this new facility on completion of Winnipeg's new airport terminal expected next year. This is a golden opportunity for continual 'C' Force public awareness because the expected flow of visitors to the museum.

Memorial Plagues

The HKVA Memorial Project Committee is looking at erecting memorial plaques to mark geographic features that have been named after 'C' Force personnel. These memorial plaques will be erected along the Trans-Canada Trail within the Whiteshell Provincial Park and in the Town of Pinawa. There are four geographic features that are named after 'C' Force Personnel. Furey Island (Pinawa) was named after Private Joseph Fury who was killed when roof collapsed at Tokyo 5B Niigata-Rinko POW Camp. French Island (Pinawa) was named after Lieutenant Charles French who was killed during the Battle; Woodward Island (Eleanor Lake) was named after Private Cyril Sydney Woodward who died of diseases at Tokyo 5B Niigata-Rinko POW Camp. The last is Ellis Island (Bererton Lake) named after Private Percy John Ellis who killed by the Japanese for attempting to escape.

Mobile Display

The Memorial Project Committee has been successful at getting grants from two local foundations for a mobile display unit. The display will be used for exhibiting at conventions, symposiums and other public venues to tell the highlight events related to the 'C' Force story. Part of the grant included a laptop computer and a large monitor that will show movies, slide shows and other visuals that can depict specific and general episodes of the 'C' story.

Wong Nei Chong Gap Plaque Dedication

Veterans Affair Canada (Winnipeg) has received the duplicate of the Wong Nei Chong Gap Memorial Plaque that was unveiled at Wong Nei Chong Gap, Hong Kong in December 2005 Pilgrimage. A site is being prepared in Brookside Cemetery, Military Section for the memorial. The dedication of the plaque will take place in September 2007. The exact date of the event will be announced at a later date



Why "TAPS" is played. We in the North A

We in the North America have all heard the haunting bugle arrangement of Taps, a song that gives us that lump in our throats and usually tears in our eyes at such events as Legion ceremonies and military funerals. But, do you know the story behind the music? If not, I think you will be interested to find out about its humble beginnings and the lyrics.

It is reported to have begun in 1862 during the U.S. Civil War, when Union army Captain Robert Ellicombe was with his men near Harrison's Landing in Virginia. The Confederate army was on the other side of the narrow strip of land.

During the night, Captain Ellicombe heard the moans of a soldier who lay severely wounded on the field. Not knowing if it was a Union or Confederate soldier, the Captain decided to risk his life and bring the stricken man back for medical attention.

Crawling on his stomach through the gunfire, the captain reached the stricken soldier and began pulling him toward his encampment. When the captain finally reached his own lines, he discovered it was actually a Confederate soldier, but the soldier was dead

The captain lit a lantern and suddenly caught his breath and went numb with shock. In the dim light, he saw the face of the soldier. It was his son. The boy had been studying music in the South when the war broke out. Without telling his father, the boy enlisted in the Confederate Army.

The following morning, heartbroken, the father asked permission of his superiors to give his son a full military burial, despite his enemy status. His request was only partially granted.

The captain had asked if he could have a group of Army band members play a funeral dirge for his son at the funeral. The request was turned down since the soldier was a Confederate. But, out of respect for the father, they did say they could give him one musician.

The captain chose a bugler. He asked the bugler to play a series of musical notes he had found on a piece of paper in the pocket of the dead youth's uniform. This wish was granted. The haunting melody, we now know as "Taps" used at military funerals was born. The words are:

Day is done ... Gone the sun

From the lakes ... From the hills. From the sky. All is well.

Safely rest .. God is nigh.

Fading light .. Dims the sight .

And a star ... Gems the sky

Gleaming bright From afar.

Drawing nigh . Falls the night. Thanks and praise ...

For our days.

Neath the sun ... Neath the stars...

Neath the sky. As we go

This we know... God is nigh

I, too, have felt the chills while listening to "Taps," but I have never seen all the words to the song until now. I didn't even know there was more than one verse. I also was unaware of the story behind the song and I didn't know if you had either so I thought I'd pass it along.
