So much has been said, so many words have been written about our old friend Lance that I am afraid that what I might say at this time will sound repetitive if not a bit insincere. I hope that I will be forgiven for using this newsletter to express my thoughts.

I feel a deep personal loss on his passing, because I have known him in good times and in bad, going back close to seventy years.

I was in his platoon in D company of the Royal Rifles, I was with him in our first encounter with the enemy and with our last encounter with the enemy.

I profited from his wisdom in the prison camps, and marveled at his ability to figure out how to approach and solve a problem.

Since 1945, I have had the pleasure of associating with him on many occasions, and was always impressed with his gentle nature and his wisdom.

His record as a soldier is well known. All who knew him, not only his army friends, but everyone with whom he associated, held him in highest regard. He will be missed by many people.

On behalf of the Hong Kong Veterans' Association I extend sincere sympathy to Dale and Randy, and to Mitzi and Alan, who cared for him in his last time on earth as no one else could have done. He was indeed fortunate to have had such a daughter and son-in-law.

A memorial service was held for him in Ottawa, and his ashes will be interred next summer at his home in the Gaspe.

We will remember him.

SURVIVORS

HONOURS AND AWARDS

While we are on the subject of honours and awards, Mike Babin has alerted me to an award given by VAC.

The following is a quote from a page titled, "What's New" on the Veterans Affairs Canada web site: "Since serving in uniform, many of Canada's Veterans have continued to provide outstanding service to their country, their communities, and their fellow Veterans. To formally recognize those contributions, the Governor General has authorized the creation of the *Minister of Veterans Affairs Commendation*.

"The Commendation will be awarded annually to those exceptional Veterans who have contributed in an exemplary manner to the care and well-being of Veterans; and/or to the remembrance of the contributions, sacrifices and achievements of Veterans.

"The Commendation is intended primarily for Veterans, but in rare circumstances may be awarded to non-Veterans. The Commendation may also be awarded posthumously." End of quote.

The names of two Hong Kong Veterans appear on the lists of recipients: John Stroud in 2002, and Bill Mayne in 2003.

Should we be submitting names of HK Veterans for consideration?

Treasurer's Report "Dues and Views" - Barry Mitchell

I would like to take this opportunity to put forward a few comments on the year that has just passed, or the "Year of the Veteran". Other business got in the way of providing me the space for putting forward my thoughts on this matter that was, and is, so very special to all of us.

From my vantage point, the designation by the federal government of a full year to honour our veterans was most effective as it focused the public's attention on these most deserving Canadian men and women.

Our organization certainly felt the impact of Veterans Affairs Canada putting its considerable resources into our convention in Ottawa. Our attendance swelled as a result of the generous funding provided to the veterans and caregivers to enable them to come to the nation's capital to celebrate the end of WWII. While long overdue, the recognition of the Hong Kong veterans by government at this event in terms of dollars, manpower, dignitaries, and overall energy, was greatly appreciated by the veterans and in fact by all those associated with our proud organization.

Appropriately, there was of course lots of celebrating at the convention but we also got a little bit of work done too. For example, most of the Regional Treasurers of the HKVCA got together briefly to review some of the common challenges facing our association as far as finances are concerned.

We discovered that we were not taking full advantage of our designation as a charity by regularly providing those who donate to the Commemorative Association with a tax deductible receipt. It was agreed that we should all let our membership know that we are registered as a charity with the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA) and this permits us to issue tax receipts for straight donations. As a guideline keep paperwork and to the reasonable, we are asking our membership people to limit the issue of tax receipts to gifts of \$20.00 or more, exclusive of annual dues. The cost of maintaining our organization is on the increase and our most function—keeping important touch with you through newsletters, etc.—grows on a regular basis.

The HKVCA is now well established in almost every Province with a membership of about 1,200. This number, however, includes veterans and widows who don't pay dues but are BY FAR the most generous group when it comes to making donations. So while the number of Regular (dues-paying) members is slowly increasing, our

fund raising is lagging with a diminishing number of donations coming our way. Thus we ask everyone keep to the Commemorative Association in mind when considering which charities you are going to support and now you know you will receive a tax-deduction receipt at the time of your donation.

Thanks to the Treasurers and Membership people in the Regions across the country who volunteer their time to collect dues, pay bills and assist in various executive duties. I receive excellent reports each month from most of you and appreciate your co-operation in national initiatives. I am confident we can continue to meet our challenges financial in putting forward a variety of meaningful programs.

How Membership Works

Legally, HKVCA is classed as a Corporation, and there are formal rules about membership that we must follow.

When you pay your membership fee at the Region level, you gain the right to vote on Corporation matters, but each member is only allowed one vote.

In some cases we've found that duplicate memberships have been approved. This is usually due to the fact that the individual wants to keep track of activities in more than one Region and so joins multiple Regions.

We need your help to eliminate these duplicate memberships. Please only pay dues to your Region of choice. If you wish to receive newsletters from another region, simply contact that Region and indicate your wishes. You will be placed on that Region's mailing list. A nominal charge for this service may be requested.

Here is the story in Gerry's own words from an e-mail he sent to me: --- "Just another event in the life of a HK vet. I was asked to attend at the cenotaph with 5 other Vets for the Governor General's visit, which I did. The Premier was first to arrive and shook our hands and thanked us for coming. Then the Governor General arrived, talked to each of us and asked me where I served, and said she was glad to meet me. The driveway from the cenotaph to the Legislative Building was lined with children and Her Honour made her way along them. Our escort named Daphne led us at a discreet distance behind. Suddenly the children all started to cheer, I wasn't sure why then Daphne said " well they sure like you" and next thing I'm walking along the line shaking hands with all these kids, I turned to Daphne and said "and I don't even play hockey". We were later taken to the main floor of the Legislature and seated right behind the Ministers for ceremony. It was a pleasant experience."

Speaking of Governors, there was an event that occurred in Victoria almost a year ago that I have not yet mentioned in our national newsletter. Of course, local residents will already know this story so I hope they won't mind while I

share it with the rest of you. Victoria had outgrown its old "Memorial Arena" which was built just after the end of the Second World War. It contained a plaque dedicated to the memory of those who fought and died in that war. A new arena was built on the old site and named the Save-On-Foods Memorial Centre. Perhaps her most significant achievement was the introduction of "Canada in Hong Kong 1941-1945, The Forgotten Heroes" - a set of lesson plans to be used in schools across Canada to teach high school students about the Battle for Hong Kong and the internment and treatment of the POWs. Pat recently had the

document translated into French to broaden its audience. As the number of Veterans dwindles each year it becomes so much more important to spread the Hong Kong story, and these lesson plans are an excellent vehicle for doing that. Although Pat decided not to run for re-election, she is staying very active in the HKVCA with her continued focus on encouraging schools to adopt the lesson plans.

Sandi Cameron. We finished last year in excellent financial shape, thanks in no small part to Sandi's role as Treasurer, and her diligence in maintaining our books and watching our financial p's and q's. She was also a major contributor to the hugely successful National Convention in Ottawa last summer.

Lori Smith. Although Lori has relinquished her position of Secretary, she continues as Ontario's Membership Chair. Keeping our list of several hundred members up to date is no small feat, but Lori stays right on top of the task.

Sylvia Mason. As one of our Deputy Directors, Sylvia willingly and capably took on several special projects throughout her term, most recently developing the bilingual flyer referred to below.

Without the willing volunteerism these HKVCA members displayed over their terms our organization simply could not have run. We owe them our gratitude.

I'd also like to introduce the newest member of Ontario's executive team: Mark Purcell, our new Treasurer. He's the grandson of Leonard Corrigan (WG), and Pat Turcotte's nephew. Welcome, Mark! I'm particularly pleased to have Mark on board as he is the first (to my knowledge) of the "3rd generation" to serve on an HKVCA executive. Hopefully Mark's

willingness to get involved in the HKVCA will point the way for others of his age group, as the long-term future of our Association is dependent on his generation.

As I mentioned earlier, a major project for us has been the development and distribution of the lesson plans for high schools. We were able to secure substantial funding from VAC to translate our original English version into French and do a print run. In January Pat and Bernard Turcotte, Gordon Coyne and I held an "envelope stuffing festival" at Pat's house, as a result of which we mailed some 300 copies of the French version to schools and school boards across the country that French-language programs. Gordon is handling any orders that come in while Pat is vacationing in Arizona. We plan to follow up with these schools to encourage them to incorporate the lesson plans into their curricula.

We also created a bilingual flyer for use at teachers' conventions and other events to advertise our English and French lesson plans, George MacDonnell's book "One Soldier's Story" and the French-"Bernard language book Castonguay - Prisonnier de Guerre au Japon". Young Canadian men continue to be placed in harm's way and suffer casualties and death. The stories of our HK veterans continues

to hold high interest by the general public and make excellent gifts, especially to the older generation. Perhaps you are seeking a birthday gift, or just a way of saying "thanks" to a special person - think of giving a book. They are always well received.

The Royal Rifles of Canada in Hong Kong 1941-1945 by Grant Garneau; \$50.00 postage included.

Michael Palmer wrote a book in tribute to his grandfather. Although not in book format, we have copies printed on 81.2 X 11 paper and neatly bound. It contains many photographs and illustrations. The cost is \$38.50 plus \$7.50 postage
