#### THE REDEDICATION OF THE HONG VETERANS MEMORIAL WALL - C. R. [Ron] McGuire

A number of our members have told me they miss seeing my contributions to the newsletter so I thought it was time I did a piece to let readers know that I am still alive and active with our great organization.

For a brief overview of some of my activities, I continue to do what I can to tell the stories of our veterans, and to help the HKVCA and promote its objectives.

Last November I prepared my thirteenth Remembrance Month exhibit for the Nepean Museum, the theme was "Canadians on the Home Front". There was a portion concerning what the families of our Hong Kong Veterans were doing to prepare Red Cross parcels and helping their loved ones in the POW camps. Promotion literature for our Memorial Wall was on each side of my Hong Kong Veterans-POWs, 1941-1945" wreath. The wreath was absent for the 11 November as Ted Terry, [his father, Ted Senior passed away as a POW] and I laid it at the Carlingwood Shopping Center at 11am and the Westboro cenotaph at 2 pm during the nicest weather I can ever recall for a Remembrance Day. This is becoming a tradition for Ted and me as it was the fourth year we did it together and plan to continue to do so, long into the future.

This November my Nepean exhibit will Museum be to remember Canada's contributions during the Korean War. Next year, 2011, the theme will be the 70th anniversary of the Defence of Hong Kong and "C" Force. I will be utilizing much of what many of you will have seen in my exhibits at our conventions in Granby in 1999, Winnipeg in 2001, Victoria in 2003, Ottawa 2005 and 2009 and Calgary in 2007 and, the Nepean Museum in 2001 and 2005.

I was part of the committee that planned the great event that unfortunately, was not to be, the rededication ceremony for the completed Memorial Wall and its extensive landscaping, on Sunday, 15 August, one year after it was unveiled. Because of the weather, teeming rain and very threatening lightning, it was decided only an hour before it was to take place, to cancel the ceremony. Unfortunately, we could not get word to everyone and despite the rain; people came and were around the Memorial for most of the day. While I was there, for about two hours from 2.30-4.30, there was always about 20-25 people coming and going---everyone I spoke with was very pleased with the finished Memorial and the landscaping. The photos throughout the newsletter will confirm this for those who have not yet had the opportunity to see it.

I am pleased to report that Ken Ewing has recovered very well from that bad bout of illness he had last year. I had a very nice visit one afternoon in June with he and Susan at their lovely home overlooking the Rideau River near Burritt's Rapids. It was one of those frequent hot, humid days we have had in the Ottawa area this summer, but it was lovely and cool on the new deck their children literally built for them one day, as their Golden Fiftieth anniversary gift. I am sure readers will join me in wishing the Ewings, a belated happy milestone wedding anniversary day.

I am sorry to report that Eric Maloney [RRC] had a heart attack on 31 August but I am pleased that he is doing very well, though at the time I am writing this, 11 September, he is still in the hospital and not expected to be able to go home until the 14th. ## Ontario Education Committee

Before Ottawa the Commemoration ceremonies were to take place, Mike Babin, Bernard Turcotte and I were invited to participate in the get-together on August 14th to be held in Mississauga by the August 15 -1945 Foundation. This organization consists of the survivors, and the children of the civilians held in POW camps by the Japanese in various places in the Far East during World War II. Those present included many who were children themselves during this period of imprisonment. Several speakers addressed the crowd of 250 people, including the Consul General of the Kingdom of the Netherlands, and we were welcomed by Rudi Lie, the Commissioner for the Southern Ontario Branch of the August 15, 1945 Foundation. Several presentations were made including a Powerpoint study by Sandra Vanderzee-Clark titled "Children of POW parents", and a beautifully recorded version of "The Captives Hymn" composed by Margaret Dryburgh in a POW camp in Sumatra. Following the Memorial Ceremony itself, a number of wreaths were laid, including one by Mike Babin and Pat Turcotte on behalf of HKVCA. Earlier in the programme, on more than one occasion, the valour of the Canadian soldiers who fought in Hong Kong was mentioned, and in one instance Mike & Pat were asked to stand to be acknowledged as representing the soldiers who fought there. The meeting itself was followed by an Indonesian food buffet, which met with much approval on the part of those present.

The Ottawa Memorial Wall Ceremony to be held at 2 p.m. was cancelled because of a tremendous rainstorm, which lasted most of the day. Fortunately, many HKVCA who had arrived for that event were present in the morning, and were able to attend the first ceremony of the day being held indoors at the Conference Centre (the old Union Station) at 10 a.m. All veterans of the Far East were to be honoured there, and many HKVCA members were able to connect after the Ceremony, as well as enjoying the full-course dinner, which was offered to all attending. There were over 100 veterans present, with a total of 500 people filling the room. National HKVA President Phil Doddridge laid a wreath on behalf of HKVCA.

It was possible to get in touch with a few key people during our Ottawa visit, including Ron McGuire, who was finally able to be presented with his Award of Appreciation for the many years he after spent looking has the Memorabilia Room at the Conventions, arranging for various veterans to be considered for the Canadian Veterans Hall of Valour, and not least, his 10 years of service as the Area Rep. for the North East (Ottawa region). We are glad to hear that although he is turning his Area Rep. job over to Mitzi Ross, he will continue to work on behalf of HKVCA.

We were also able to connect with Ted Terry and Ann Hyland, who last year looked after our participation in the Parliamentary Library's Resource Fair. They are willing to be involved again as long as it doesn't interfere with a trip that they have already committed to taking.

Gail Angel and I had a lengthy meeting at the Lord Elgin in which we discussed some of the preparing possibilities of an effective booth/table at several of the functions coming up in the Fall and Winter. We discussed the best way to include those items we currently use as a sort of kit. Veteran Gerry "Sunny" Sunstrum (RRC), too, is enjoying the summer, comfortably ensconced at home in Niagara Falls, Ontario. His big news is that he was able to be in Ottawa on Sunday, August 15th to mark the 65th anniversary of VJ Day. The special services, as planned. consisted of а commemorative ceremony at the National War Memorial, followed later in the day, by a re-dedication and wreath-laying at the HKVA Memorial Wall. We are indebted to his son, Neil, and daughter-in-law

Joyce for providing his transportation. Unfortunately for Gerry and all other attendees, the Weather Man was in a vile mood, resulting in cancellation of outdoor activities.

Grenville Onyette (RCAF): In the last Newsletter we reported the death in Niagara Falls of Jean Onyette, widow of S/L Grenville Onyette (RCAF), who was a member of the HKVA until his 1996. death Additional in information has since come to hand, courtesy of the Canadian Veterans Hall of Valour. On April 4, 1942 Grenville was the navigator on Catalina QL-A patrolling an area of the Indian Ocean to the south of Ceylon, the base for the Royal Navy's Eastern Fleet. Following an eleven-hour mission, they had begun turning for home when they spotted what turned out to be elements of a Japanese naval force, steaming in the direction of Ceylon. Their intention was to launch a surprise attack on Colombo, similar to the one carried out earlier at Pearl Harbour. Enemy fighters downed the Catalina, but not before the radio operator (Fred Phillips) had managed to send two warning messages to Colombo. As a result of this incident, the captain of the aircraft, Air Commodore Leonard Birchall, was awarded the DFC, and became widely known as The Saviour of Ceylon. Three crewmen were killed in the attack and the others, including Birchall, spent the rest of the war as POWs.

Austen Cambon: Austen is a member of the HKVCA, residing in Oakville, Ontario. He is a brother of the late Dr. Kenneth Cambon (RRC). Ken was a rifleman with the Royal Rifles at Hong Kong. In 1990 he published "Guest of Hirohito", a widely acclaimed "Chronicle by one of the youngest men of the Royal Rifles of Canada, depicting the will and determination to survive the horrors of Japanese prisoner of war days" (Robert Manchester).

Austen is a graduate of the Royal Military College of Canada, and served in Korea with 3RCHA. He is a management consultant and educator, who has taught in Canada, USA, China and the Middle East. At the present time he teaches part-time in the Business School at Humber College in Etobicoke, Ontario, and at The University of GuelphHumber, where in 2007 he was voted "Business Professor of the Year". Last Summer Austen and other members of the Cambon Family were present for the dedication of the Memorial Wall. As he has said, "It looks great!"

Widow Marion Jamieson (David Allan Jamieson RRC): We were sorry to learn of Marion's death on July 25, aged 92, at Morriston Park Nursing Home, near Guelph, Ontario. She had been a widow for 20 years. Her interment will occur at her birthplace, Caledonia, Ontario. She is survived by a son, Allan, a retired high school teacher, and by a daughter, Catherine, who teaches history at Lakehead University, Thunder Bay, Our condolences Ontario. are extended to the family.

Widow Dorothy McColm (Murray McColm RRC) continues in residence in St. Joseph's Villa Nursing Home in Dundas, Ontario, in close contact with her daughter. Elaine, and son-in-law Dan Dorey. Unfortunately, her health has failed, and she has suffered a broken hip. Dorothy's grandson, Jay Dorey, lives in Ottawa. Several family members attended the dedication of the Memorial Wall last summer. Thoughts of Murray, who enlisted at age 16, and suffered a lifetime of torment after returning to Canada, have never faded.
