Promote the study of the Battle of HK in schools—we wrote the Manitoba Minister of Education to try and have a meeting about placing our story in the Manitoba school curriculum.

Developing materials to better tell the "Hong Kong Story"—we had a couple of meetings with a display company to determine the costs involved with upgrading the display boards which we use as part of our presentations to school children, teachers, and others.

Develop partnerships with other organizations—I have had a couple of dealings lately with the Korean War Vets Association on matters of mutual interest.

Maintain a website—the National Executive is very active in maintaining and now upgrading our award winning website.

Participating in memorial services—Manitoba had a most successful V-J Day memorial service and celebration last week, attended by almost 100 members and guests.

Remembering "C" Force and all Canadians in the War Against Japan

It was an honour to be able to play a small part in the Ottawa 2005 Convention by being responsible for the memorabilia/sales room. I wish to thank Connie for her assistance and all those who brought their treasures to display. I would be remiss if I did not extend special THANKS to Ken Skelton for all he had to go through bringing portions of his fantastic collection to fill ten tables plus an open corner of the room. Your efforts were greatly appreciated I assure you Ken, as were the chats we had about our common interests. I gave my slide illustrated talk and while I did not take a count I've been told there were well over a hundred attending including many of our veterans. My sincere thanks to Kim Brunet {wife of Michael, son of Lou Brunet, CPC-Brigade HQ, who was also in attendance with his daughter and mother, Lillian}, Vince Lopata and Maze {WG} for Dick their "technical" assistance correcting a problem I encountered. It is obvious I must again enter the 21st century {I've just finally become

semi-"computerized"} and replace my 1970's Kodak Carousel and slides with the modern equivalents. It is now on my never-ending list of "things to do".

There were many highlights for me at the Convention, but the one topping the list was seeing again the Veterans and their families that I knew and, meeting for the first time, those I only knew by name. Like all attending veterans Eric Maloney {RR of C} was hoping to meet comrades he had not seen in years. He was having difficulty in locating some of those he knew were there and I was happy to be able to arrange for happy but touching meetings between Eric and Oswald "Toots" Clark, Arnold Ross and Gus Bitzer. I think all attending would agree with me that the only real problem with this truly successful event was--- there was never enough time to do everything!

The weekend after was another busy one for me. I had an expanded version of my "C" Force exhibit, which was displayed on eight tables at our Convention, at the Military Collectors Club of Canada convention held at the Chateau Laurier. For this event it required twenty tables plus wall space where I mounted panels. It complied with the convention theme and honoured "C" Force and all Canadians [there were over 8000!] who fought in the war against Japan and commemorated the real end of the Second World War on 15 August 1945. It never ceases to amaze me how many people I encounter think the war ended on 8 May! To my surprise, the organizers entered this exhibit competitively all the many memories, good and bad. my exhibits brought to mind.

My exhibit was again expanded and from 1-30 November it was in the Nepean Museum. This is my ninth Remembrance Month display honouring Canadians and Newfoundlanders at war. I will be arranging for photographs of each portion of the display to be put on the HKVCA web site. There was an Sunday house on November. The weather was lovely and there was a nice turn out, including Ian Doull, the previous editor, who I would like to thank for doing the fine job he did on the always, welcomed newsletter. I was particularly pleased that Maloney [RR of C] was able to attend along with Col. Robert Grogan who began his 39 year military career as part of the HMS Uganda's crew while it was in the Pacific, CWO Hector Rafuse, who, with his brother were also career soldiers, both had two tours in Korea and numerous Peacekeeping assignments as did Major Dick Malott, during his RCAF career. These four gentlemen were excellent representatives of several different aspects of Canada's military history and were always engaged in conversation by visitors.

REGION REPORTS

From British Columbia

All of our membership in British Columbia is deeply saddened by the death of Lionel Speller; Lionel was the long-time President of the HKVA in BC. His family was by his side. His daughter Carol and son Ross were both in town and helping their Mom. Carol said her Dad went peacefully. He was not awake at all for the last day or so. Our most heartfelt condolences go out to Ida, Ross and Carol, and all his family and comrades.

Jeff Bell, a Times Colonist staff reporter, interviewed Cliff Chadderton for his article entitled "A

strong, committed man". Jeff Bell wrote, in part, -- "Lionel Speller will be remembered for his passion for the lot of war veterans, dedication to his family and more than six decades of service to the Canadian Royal Legion Chadderton said his friend, who died April 30 at 86, was always strongwilled and committed to a cause – as demonstrated to federal politicians. "I once had him in front of five parliamentary committees and said 'OK Lionel, you're my witness, you tell these people what it's all about." Chadderton laughed and said, "Some of the language had to be struck from the record." That straight-talking nature never left him, Chadderton said. "The last time I saw him he was in Broadmead Lodge, and he still had all the fight in his eye." Chadderton said Speller's determination was in evidence as he went off to war. "The wouldn't give him motorcycle, and he was crazy about motorcycles. So he brought his own. How the hell he smuggled it on the troop ship, I don't know."

Among all the cars, there were three motorcycles in the funeral procession at Royal Oak Cemetery attended by close friends and family. A friend of his son Ross was riding in his Navy dress uniform and another friend rode his green vintage Harley Davidson, circa 1940. The third bike was mine, a black 600 Honda Shadow. On the gas tank and back fender is the HK emblem. I knew Lionel would like it if I rode my bike. I first got to know Lionel Speller in 2001 when I became Regional Director here in BC. I still remember the first time he found out that I rode a motorcycle. He said, with a huge grin on his face, "I knew there was something I liked about you!" We often talked about motorcycles when I visited him when he was at Broadmead Lodge.

Weather permitting; I would ride my bike. He always got such a kick out of it when I would walk in wearing my leathers and carrying my helmet.

Following the funeral, there was a memorial service held at the Trafalgar/Pro Patria Legion Victoria. The hall was filled with friends and family, Hong Kong veterans and commemorative members, and dozens of Legion members. Aubrey Flegg and Betty Waldenberger, Gerry and Ev Gerrard: and Arnie and Meta Parker were at the service.

Several HKVCA members (Kate Sarginson, Harvelyn McInnis, Murray Doull and David Anderson and his wife) and, Bridget Preston, the Director for Veterans Affairs in Victoria, were in attendance. I spoke on behalf of the HKVCA and passed on messages from Phil Doddridge and Carol Hadley to the family. The Legion was packed and Lionel received a wonderful tribute from all in attendance.

I spoke with Ida, on August 16th, the day that would have been their 54th wedding anniversary. She's holding up well. Her children visit as often as they can and she's had friends and relatives helping out. Months and months before Lionel had to go to Broadmead Lodge, she and Lionel had made an application to Immigration to have a Filipino girl come to stay with them to help them stay in their home as long as possible. Fortunately, Ida had also signed the forms along with Lionel and so she was able to continue the process. Julie arrived this past week and she moved into the suite in the basement. Ida was very pleased and her children are much relieved to know that someone is there with her. Julie's aunt is a friend of Ida's and lives just around the corner. It's a wonderful situation for everyone. Ida asked me to tell you that she really appreciates all the cards and

letters she received. When she's feeling low she takes out the cards and letters and re-reads the kind messages that you've sent her.

We are extremely sorry to inform you of more deaths in the Hong Kong family in British Columbia.

Maurice Lapointe (WG) passed away March 30th/06

Jack Rose (RCCS) died on May 18^{th.} Jack was suffering with Alzheimer's and recently suffered a stroke. He does not leave a widow.

Other recent deaths in the Hong Kong Family: Mrs. William Hall (widow of William Hall), Mrs. Margaret LeBlanc (widow of George LeBlanc), Mrs. Harold Shepherd (widow of Harold Shepherd.)

Harold Heath, RRC, passed away on April 13/06. Harold had been living in a care facility in North Vancouver for several years. For quite some time his daughter, Sharon Planidin, had been trying to place him in a care home called Totem Lodge in her hometown of Sechelt. She was successful three weeks before he passed away at the age of 92 from pneumonia. Harold has been cremated without a service as per his wishes. Harold did not leave a widow. The family gathered in early May from across Canada to celebrate his life.

Rhona Muir, wife of William (Bill) Muir (WG, H-17622), passed away on July 13/06 in Comox BC. Rhona had been suffering from Alzheimer's for several years and had been hospitalized since last summer. Bill is now residing in a Senior's Retirement Residence in Comox.

A couple of months ago, Carol Hadley received an email from a fellow named Ian Lester, who represents a UK organization called the Far East Prisoners of War Memorial Church. The church is located in Wymondham, Norfolk, England.

The church is intended as a tribute to POWs who were interned in the Far East, and was established by a Roman Catholic priest who had himself been a Japanese POW for 3 ½ years. The church commemorates all FEPOWs, regardless of religion, race or country of origin.

Lester contacted Carol because the church also maintains a web site that contains text and audio recordings of interviews with POWs. To date, all of their interviews had been with British people, with the exception of an Australian nurse.

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Lester was coming to Canada on a holiday, and wondered if there might be a Canadian HK POW who he might interview.

Here is the message:

Today I ran across your site and found someone listed that we have lost track of and want to find out what has happened to him:

E30373 Rifleman. Miller, Ernest James. Company D, Platoon 18. Hometown Jacquet River, N.B.

Upon return to Canada after his POW internment he came to Regina, Sask. and got a job on the Bogdane farm at Pilot Butte, Sask., which is just outside of Regina.

He suffered a horrible injury and lost the use of an arm in a farm accident while he and Shirley Bogdane, age 13, the farmer's daughter, were drilling postholes.

The Bogdanes, and especially Shirley, thought the world of Ernie, and, through an unfortunate happening, Ernie could never be located after his release after a lengthy stay in a Regina, Sk. hospital, but, he finally did write to the Bogdanes, and, that is where the heartbreak of a young girl especially too place.

Shirley always rode her horse into Pilot Butte, to pick up the mail

from the Post Office, and when she saw that letter from Ernie she can never forget her excitement to this day, she remembers putting the letter in her back pocket and riding like the wind home, bursting into the house announcing "a letter from Ernie, a letter from Ernie" and when she reached for the letter, to her utter dismay, the letter was gone, lost during her race on horseback to deliver it.

After much searching along her route the poor girl had to give up, and, to this day, just about 60 years later, Shirley still wonders, "what does, or what did Ernie think of them if they didn't even answer his letter."

Can you help? I will forward the information to Shirley, she still lives just outside Regina and is a good friend of mine.
