HKVCA 2015 Involvement Survey

Survey Background

The results of an online survey of HKVCA members to determine their desire to be involved in activities of the association, and their preferences for receiving information from the HKVCA.

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Survey Background and Methodology

For some time the membership of the HKVCA has been declining. At the same time, we have been finding it more difficult to engage the members we do have in volunteering their time to help with the association's activities.

There has been considerable speculation on the part of the Board of Directors as to why this is the case. It seems that once a Veteran passes away, his family begins to lose interest in the association. But other factors have been suggested, including, among others, how we communicate with our members and our modest use of social media.

The idea of doing a survey arose to help pinpoint the reasons for this.

The survey was conducted using an online service, surveymonkey.com. All HKVCA members with an email address were sent invitations to participate in the survey. We also posted a link on the HKVCA web site, and on the HKVCA Facebook page. In all, 373 members were invited, and 185 completed the survey, giving a response rate of 50%. The invitation encouraged recipients to forward the survey to others who were not HKVCA members, but it appears this was not done frequently.

In all of the following material, *Hong Kong* will be shortened to *HK*. Where percentages are shown, only whole numbers are used for ease of reading. This may result in not totaling to exactly 100% in some cases.

Many of the questions asked gave the respondent the opportunity to write a free-form answer. All of these responses are given in Appendix "A". The survey questions themselves are provided in Appendix "B".


This report does not do analysis or draw any conclusions from the survey results, but rather simply presents those results for the consideration of the Board of Directors. A logical follow-on task would be for a small committee to analyze the results and recommend what steps might be taken in response.

Demographics


The 185 respondents were distributed by region as shown below.



There were also 44 surveys submitted via our web site and 1 via Facebook, but the region names were not collected from those surveys. The results of these, however, are included in the overall results.

90% of respondents said they were related to a HK veteran.

The largest number of respondents were sons or daughters of the veterans. The relationships were distributed as follows:



Among the "Other" category were: Niece/Nephew (13), Son/daughter-in-law (6), and Brother.


Of the 10% who said they were not related to a HK veteran, 21% said they did not know a HK veteran.

90% of respondents who said they were related to or knew a HK veteran reported that the veteran is no longer living and 19% said the veteran did not return from the war.


Respondents were asked to describe how often the veteran spoke of his wartime experiences.



The ages of the respondents were:




Respondents were asked whether they have family members who do not belong to the HKVCA. 83% responded Yes.





The responses from those who answered "Other" are given in Appendix "A".


10% of respondents said that they had once been HKVCA members, but have dropped out. They gave these reasons for having no longer being members (multiple responses accepted):





Information Preferences

Respondents were asked to rank their preferences for receiving information from the HKVCA. The results were calculated by assigning the highest weight to the respondent's preferred method, next highest weight to their second preferred method and so on. The weighted averages were:




Respondents were asked about what device they primarily use to search for or receive information.





Respondents in the 30-39 age group responded much more favourably to the use of smartphones than the other age groups.








Respondents were asked how often they visit the HKVCA web site.

The most frequent users were those aged 65 and over.






Respondents aged 19 to 39 were more strongly in favour of "Improved readibility of newsletter pages" and "Better formatted for mobile devices" than other age groups.


Interest and Volunteering




69% of respondents said that they have done volunteer work, whether for the HKVCA or another organization.


Respondents were asked what they liked about the volunteer work they have done. Multiple choices were permitted. "Other" comments are in Appendix "A".

APPENDIX A

This appendix contains "Other" responses to questions which permitted a write-in answer.

"Why don't your family members belong to the HKVCA?"

They many other items they are already involved with that take up much of their time.

Membership payments should be made available via internet banking

Aunt/uncle/cousins: they have never expressed an interest.

Financially unable

Do not belong to any military association.

Both my son and daughter are very much aware of their grandfathers military history and have read three books concerning Hong Kong, they are The Royal Rifles of Canada Hong Kong 1941 - 1945, Hell On Earth (Dave McIntosh) and Banzai You Bastards (Jack Edwards). I believe it is an age thing I'm sure one day (hoping) they will see fit to join.

They did belong, and did attend the reunion dinners when my Dad was alive. I really don't know if they are currently members or not.

Our son is very busy with other activities, but he knows one veteran and knew a deceased veteran.

They live in xxxxxxx

Grand children just do not relate to the stories & history. I have attempted to interest them, but feel the reponse is only polite for my benefit.

Seems they do not prefer to 'deal' with this part of the family life, now that our veteran is gone there seems nothing left to remind them of what he went through and what his contribution was; plus they do not seem well informed about current military issues, etc. even now - i.e. out of sight, out of mind and they have little to any military presence in their lives

They live in the USA, and out of touch

I never really spoke to them about joining..but I will

Other priorities in their busy lives

Not related, not interested

I am the Padre in Winnipeg. Meetings take place during school and work time.

Some are too young

Younger family members tend not to want to add to their current list of interests. Nephews & Nieces while interested, tend to believe the subject belongs to the direct family.

I have never thought to ask them, but I will now. Thank you.

Probably feel no need. Not an immediate family member

My children and grandchildren never met my dad and have not shown enough interest in his POW experience to enroll them in HKVCA at this time. We take every opportunity we can to share Dads' history, and we will continue to do so.

They may feel that because some are involved, they represent the family, and they don't need to join. They're interested in the history but may feel it's too remote for them at their young age.

Current activities, or approach, are not of interest to them.

Live in USA

I don't know. I have tried to get them interested in joining. My brother wants all dad's medals and Japanese souvenirs but doesn't want to be "bothered" with joining..whatever that foolishness means. I cdan't get my daughter or son to join either and my daughter was close to my dad.

I keep many of them in the loop

He's not a joiner, just doesn't like joining organizations. The only organization he belonged to for an extended time was the Legion but his branch closed down and he let his membership lapse.

the one member relies on me to keep him informed

Some have dropped out because of dissatisfaction regarding memorial in Ottawa.

I think they don't know about it

They do not seem interested at all in this and/or any other military-related issues -but often have an opinion of Canada's position in various military-related issues around the world - I also don't think they have much, if any, comprehension about the military, past activities or current ones.

Would probably become members if they could use debit for payment.

Would not have time to commit to activities so refrain

Since my father died in 1951 (I was a couple months from turning 3), I don't remember him and my family (my daughters) never even new him. My sister (who was 5 at his death) is aware of HKVCA. So is my dad's niece and nephew.

Not sure in most cases, but likely the more distant (nieces, nephews, aunts, uncles etc. likely feel that it's not too relevant for them.

No family

I don't have much contact with them!

"Why did you drop out of the HKVCA?"

I guess I'm sorry to say that I'm not as interested as I once was. These past few years I've been busy taking care of my sick husband and I don't really have the time to be involved with the HKVCA.

Kind of lost interest after my father died.

I was Chaplain to HKVCA in Winnipeg, but have had no contact with the organization since moving to the Fraser Valley in B.C.

Due to limited funds I deferred membership for a year.

Forgot to renew.

My Dad died and I find it quite painful to be involved

Was simply forgetful

Never received renewal information or any contact from regional group. Tried to reach out to renew but not able to contact appropriate person. I believe i was told they were merging with another province and no one ever gt back to me.

Felt that my father's war experiences ate up so much of his enjoyment of life. He was deeply affected by these experiences and, although he was a great father, I feel they robbed him and us. For a time after his death I honoured his memory and experiences by being a member of this organization. Now I choose to remember him for being the wonderful father he was and to not dwell on his war experiences.

Procrastination

I never hear about HKVCA, unless a family member tells me about something happening. Out of sight,out of mind

Because I don't drive and it is hard to go to the meetings and somewhat I may not have time. Mainly because of the driving.

My membership lapsed and I just didn't renew it.

Too many other activities in my life.

My uncle died. The war ended 60 years ago. Life goes on.

Once my mother passed away there has been little contact with people associated with the deceased HKV.

It is hard for people to find time in their busy lives to engage in volunteer or "extra" activities. Perhaps finding opportunities for people to connect to their own veteran's story and leverage that in a way that allows them to do work for the association, whether by raising awareness or by raising funds, would encourage people to participate. This is especially important now that many of the veterans have passed away and it is up to their families to ensure their story lives on. I heard something recently on the radio about the high number of young people in Israel who know nothing about the Holocaust, have never met any survivors and who generally are not interested. There are groups in Israel trying to address this - perhaps the association could look at how they are trying to engage youth in this critical part of their history and try to apply it to our own situation. Just some thoughts:).

As one gets older it is less likely they (I) will travel far from home

In certain veteran organizations (like the Polish Combatants' Association in Canada) medals are presented for membership and service to an organization. Could be one way of enticing certain people to get involved and committed for longer terms.

I am very interested in the HKVCA, the veterans and their stories. There is no lack of interest here, only time constraints in a busy career and family life. I love what you do!
