THE HONG KONG VETERANS' COMMEMORATIVE ASSOCIATION NOW HAS CHARITABLE STATUS

It's official. As of 26 September 2002 the HKVCA is now a charitable organization under Canadian federal tax legislation. After almost two years of work and several applications, the Association has been notified of its new status by the Canadian Customs and Revenue Agency (formerly Revenue Canada). As Derrill Henderson notes, the Association executive past and present underwent a steep learning curve in order to satisfy CCRA standards, which required some changes to the manner in which the Association was set up.

One piece of exciting news is that this Association is a small step away from receiving our Charity Status and possibly it may be factual by the time this newsletter is published. Our Executive members in Ottawa have been very diligent in their efforts to achieve this and we appreciate the time and persistence that it has taken.

Another wonderful item is the generosity of George MacDonell who has donated his book "One Soldier's Story" and all the profit of the sales to the 'Commemorative Association'. To manage this huge endeavour, a committee of representatives from all the Regions, headed by Derrill Henderson,

Director of Publications, has been formed. The Publications Committee is promoting the sale of George's book by seeking corporate sponsors to place the book in libraries and schools. This has the double benefit of bringing our story to the attention of the youth of Canada while hopefully raising some money for the HKVCA. The Publications Committee reports to the Executive Committee and with George's input, the funds from this project will assist in initiating more of the ideas relating to the mandate of this Association.

Last year at the National Convention held in Winnipeg, your Executive were made aware of a project that was started in British Columbia by a Canadian History teacher, working in his Masters program, with the assistance of Lionel Speller, Don McPherson and Larry Stebbe. The teacher, Graeme Stacey, as reported in the BC newsletter, has been instrumental in developing a syllabus for senior high education, which includes the Asian-Pacific theatre of war. Our veterans have assisted with this project with their recollections of events of the Battle of Hong Kong and subsequent treatment as Prisoners of War. We now have Ontario and Manitoba with this project ongoing with the expectation of success.

The Alberta/Saskatchewan veterans have asked the 'Commemorative' for assistance with their Branch and we have initiated the formation of a Regional Council. Kathie Carlson and Sheila Rattie will be contacting the 'Commemorative' members for help and a commitment to our veterans. So if you have some time we would appreciate any involvement that you

are able to give. Willingness to serve and to learn is our only prerequisite.

Our website (www.hkvca.ca) has had some wonderful changes to it due to the expertise of our Web Master, Linda May and her committee of Ron Parker and Claire Hachey. They would welcome contributions by the veterans and their families in the form of prose, poetry or pictures with captions. This is your web site. Special thanks go out to Lionel Speller and Larry Stebbe for all their efforts to make the luncheons a huge success.

On Saturday, September 7th, I was honored to attend a gallery opening in Victoria for a series of paintings named "Now and Zen" by William Allister. I met Will and his wife Mona at our luncheon in Vancouver where they shared with me that they had returned to Japan for several months in 1983 with a goal - forgiving but not forgetting. "The goal - forgiving but not forgetting brought a fine inner peace at last." Mr. Allister is a HK vet who is also the author of two award winning novels, A Handful of Rice and Where Life and Death Hold Hands. The paintings were wonderful and it was a pleasure to have a quick visit with them again. Lionel and Ida Speller and Barbara Komorsky were invited to the one-man showing. We all had a nice visit and enjoyed viewing the paintings.

Harvelyn McInnis just phoned to ask me to attend a "Reading" at Bolen Books here in Victoria on October 1, 2002. The book "Letters to Harvelyn" has just been mailed out to bookstores across the country. The publisher is Harper Collins. You may recall that this book is a compilation of letters written by Harvelyn's father while he was imprisoned. Following is an excerpt from Professor Jack Granatstein, former Director, Canadian War Museum, who reviewed the book. "This collection of extraordinary letters by Major Kenneth

Baird of the Winnipeg Grenadiers adds much to our understanding of both the battle at Hong Kong and the prisoner of war experience. There is not a shred of political correctness in these letters, most of which curse the Japanese roundly. This brutal honesty makes the book all the more valuable. "Professor Granatstein is the author of Waging War and Keeping the Peace published by University of Toronto Press.

Following the meeting for the Ladies' Inter-Club (Legion) Pool League in Victoria, one of the ladies told me she had just returned from a visit back east. Since absolutely every other location in Canada is "back east" from Vancouver Island, I asked her "How far back east?" "Greenwood, Nova Scotia." was Norma Goodwin's reply. "It's such beautiful country." I offered, "You must have had a wonderful time." We hadn't spoken often before this, except when we played pool against each other, so I sensed she had a purpose in mind. She said that, during her visit, her son-in-law showed her some photos. "I know that lady"; she told him "we play pool together. Her name is Linda". I expected she was going to tell me that she saw a picture of someone who simply looked like me, not that she had actually seen a picture of me. She said he told her I was the lady who knew about the Hong Kong Veterans. I was totally taken by surprise. Quickly I asked her what her sonin-law's name was. "Blair Mehan", was the reply. He's married to Norma's daughter Christine. Blair was the amateur military historian and member of the Forces who I told you about in our last newsletter. The pictures were of the ceremony at the Victoria Cenotaph on Christmas Day in 2001. I was completely amazed when Norma told me that she had seen a picture of me all the way on the other side of Canada.

That's my "Isn't it a small world?" story and my lead-in to invite you all to come and visit us for the National Convention in 2003. Who can tell where in the world pictures of you at the event might turn up? You just never know.

The Last Post has sounded again for a number of our Comrades. Yesterday I attended the funeral of Raymond Murray, 83, in Chandler, Quebec. There were six HK Vets there, all of us well past our allotted time of fourscore and ten years. Arnold Hunt, 92, Lance Ross. 91, Hector Hunt, 89, Arnold Ross, 85, John Duguay, 80, and Phil Doddridge, 80. It was another reminder of the importance the Hong Kong Veterans Commemorative Association.

With the Fall issue of the Quebec Branch newsletter just off the press, it is a little difficult to find something different to say. However, I want to repeat that our request for help in establishing our Military Museum received such encouraging results that we are now able to proceed with the work. To all our supporters, I offer a sincere and heartfelt thanks.

In order to receive official status there are a number of hoops to jump through, details that we didn't consider when the project was first started. All this, of course, costs money, such as architect's fees, museologist's fees, licences, and other incidentals. With your help we will be able to take a step forward, and achieve our aim of opening in June of next year. Our web site will soon be on line. We have received disturbing news from Hong Kong that the commemorative plaques that were installed on a temporary basis when we visited in 2000, have not yet been mounted on permanent installations. You will recall that there is one at Sai Wan Hill where the Royal Rifles attempted to prevent the landing of Japanese forces on December 18, 1941. A second plaque is at "Lawson's Bunker" at Wong Nei Chong Gap, and a third at Jardine's Lookout,

where Sergeant-Major Osborne lost his life. At this time we are awaiting contact with Veterans Affairs with the hope that work can be started on the permanent installation of these memorials.**

The Memory Project: Connecting Veterans and Youth in Classrooms and Over the Internet.

The Dominion Institute is pleased to announce the latest volume in the series of free Memory Project educational booklets, "Canada and Global Conflict: Susan Beharriell and Don Ethell's Half-Century Timeline".

This curriculum-based teaching tool with classroom activities, available to educators free-of-charge, follows the careers of a Peacekeeper and an Intelligence officer through the last half of the 20th century. It also includes an essay by General Romeo Dallaire on peacekeeping and conflict resolution into the new millennium.

This booklet, along with the Memory Project Volume One (Grant McRae's WWII Timeline) and Volume Two (Len Badowich's Korean War Timeline), and the documentary video "Crew of Seven" (all available free of charge), prepare students to welcome a veteran into their classroom to share his or her stories.

Hundreds of WWII, Korean War, and Peacekeeping veterans from across thecountry have been trained in classroom presentation-making, and are looking forward to sharing personal stories of Canada's past with your students, and answer their questions. After the visit, students can log on to www.TheMemoryProject.com to record the stories they are told, or to share their reflections on the veterans' story. VETERANS' CORNER

The "Push" for increased widow's benefits.

Many of you are aware of the initiative by our Patron, Cliff Chadderton, to have Veterans Affairs continue the VIP (Veterans Independent Program) for the widows. This will allow them to remain in the family home should they desire. For those unfamiliar with the program, "the goal of the Veterans Independence Program (VIP), which was introduced in 1981, is to help eligible veterans and certain civilians remain healthy and independent in their own homes or communities. Under VIP,

the Department contributes to the payment of services such as grounds maintenance, housekeeping, meals-on-wheels, personal care, care by health professionals, transportation for social activities and nursing home care". Cliff is promoting this though the National Council of Veteran Associations in Canada (NCVAC). We wholeheartedly support his efforts in this cause and are ready to assist whenever called upon.


We have an additional concern however, and that is we believe that some type of Medical and Dental plan is also warranted. Several vets have expressed this concern, both for spouses and widows. Our interpretation of the War Veterans Act implies that this is an obligation of the Canadian Government. Whether we are justified in our interpretation is a matter to be determined, but we have taken the initial steps of writing a previous Minister of Veterans Affairs to get our concern on record, and have brought up the subject in conversation with the Deputy Minister.

Our next step is to gather data to support our position that such a program is required. To that end, we ask that widows and veteran's wives complete and return the questionnaire enclosed with this newsletter. It is not necessary to sign the questionnaire, but should you have immediate concerns you would like us to pursue, please identify yourself and provide a telephone number where you can be reached.

This issue is being forwarded through the Hong Kong Veterans
Association of Canada because the initial steps were directed by Harry Atkinson and we do not wish to "change horses midstream", but the Commemorative Association has allowed the use of its corporate address for mailing purposes and will assist as required.

Rest assured that no action will be taken that might jeopardize Cliff Chadderton's thrust for the VIP for widows.

MEMORIAL CROSS



You will all remember what was commonly known as the the Mother's Silver Cross. It was often shown on national television over the years on November 11th as a mother of one of Canada's fallen heros laid a wreath at the National War Cenotaph. It was a very special honour for the chosen one as she represented every mother of every fallen soldier of every conflict in which our nation fought.

The correct (official) name for this is the Memorial Cross, and several years ago, the qualifications for this Cross were changed. The physical condition currently suffered by all Hong Kong veterans (avitaminosis) qualifies under the present interpretation of this ruling. It can be now awarded to the family, as implicated on the Eligibility Form, of any veteran whose death can be attributed to injuries acquired during active service. The Cross may ONLY be worn by the recipient on Remembrance Ceremonial occasions. There are no official rules as to where the cross must be worn, but traditionally it was worn "over the heart". There is some debate as to whether it may be worn above or below other medals. If you are one of the few where this is an issue, let your conscious be your guide.

Harry Atkinson, as one of his last issues with Veterans Affairs, had a "desk" established where submission for this Cross for HK vets would be fast tracked through the system. Derrill Henderson, National Secretary HKVCA, is controlling

these submissions. We have had several trial runs to iron out the wrinkles of the system, and are now prepared to deal with all requests.

If your family has never received a Memorial Cross, please complete and return the Eligibility Form enclosed in this newsletter. If you can also provide a copy of the death certificate and a cause of death statement, in any form, it will shortcut the process even more. Only the Eligibility statement is necessary, the other just helps things along.

The department of Veterans Affairs responsible for issuing the Cross is very busy getting the applications processed and the Cross(s) engraved, since many families are applying for them. They will be processed in batches in order of date received by the "desk".


You will be notified of the status of your application on a regular basis.

New Military Museum, Chaleur Bay, Québec

As Phil Doddridge noted in his Québec-Maritimes report, plans for a military museum in the Gaspé are well underway. The opening is tentatively scheduled for June of 2003. The website should be activated very soon: website address is www.baychaleurmilitarymuseum.ca.

Hong Kong Plaques: an update

In his Québec-Maritimes report Phil Doddridge has indicated that the plaques installed temporarily during the year-2000 Pilgrimage have not yet been permanently mounted. We have since received word from Canadian consulate staff in Hong Kong that the delays have

been due to internal government processes. While Canadian officials are still awaiting a formal response, it appears that land title transfers necessary for the bunker to be declared an historic site were only recently concluded. This factor, and a large turnover in Hong Kong government staff, are the probable causes of the delay. The Canadian official concludes thus: Please rest assured that the Consulate is very committed to this and understands how important this recognition is to the veterans and their families. The delays are very unfortunate but we are monitoring the situation very closely and will continue to raise the issue at the highest levels until we get results. I understand that the delay may be upsetting to the veterans...please reassure them that we will work at this until they are in the ground. I personally feel very honoured to have had the opportunity to meet and spend time with them and will continue to work on their behalf.

Honour and Pride

Carol Hadley includes the following: "In the last Manitoba newsletter there was an enclosure with information about a CD called "Honour and Pride." Cove Records Inc. produced this CD with the assistance of our Padre, the Rev. Gordon Shields, to assist anyone who was organizing a memorial or funeral service for veterans.
