The Memorial Wall will soon be completed.

On Monday (June 14) – the seating wall was poured and June 15 the forms came off and the sanding was done June 16 to give a “finish” to the seating wall.

The memorial wall is covered to prevent any damage that might accidentally occur. The contractor is really taking no chances.

The trees have been moved and the ground prepared for the “western” grass leading to the wall. Boulders have been selected and on site other than the one for the plaque.

The 1st phase of the patio slab was poured Friday, June 18 with the 2nd phase completed June 23rd with the soft landscaping completed by the end of June.

We have great visible access to the wall from both Sussex and King Edward. Things are moving along well. Pictures of the completed wall will be in the September newsletter.

We have completed the final form for Heritage Canada with Barry sending the audited statement to Derrill and Derrill will deliver it to them. We will be notified if all is satisfactory and receive a cheque for \$25,000, which should complete this project.

That's it for now - Memorial Wall Committee

The two most significant were my representing the National Council of Veterans Associations (NCVA) and our association at the ceremony marking the end of the war in Europe. I had the honour (thanks to our Patron, Cliff Chadderton) of laying the wreath at the National War Memorial. As my name was announced over the loud speaker, I fell in beside General (Rtd) Charles Belzile representing the Canadian Legion, Lorne McCartney of the ANAVETS, and Captain (Rtd) Paul Bender of the Merchant Navy. We then marched four abreast to the front of the Memorial and individually laid our wreaths. It was strange, for although this was to honour those that fought the Axis, visions of many of HK vets no longer with us were passing through my head. I felt quite emotional about the experience.

On the following Tuesday, I attended a special ceremony at Legion House for the planting of a tree and the unveiling of a plaque by Princess Margriet of the Netherlands, honouring the Canadians that liberated her country. I had the pleasure of being introduced to her - a most delightful and down to earth person. There was a veteran that fought in the Netherlands present, but his legs were weak and could not stand in the receiving line. An aide

mentioned him to her and pointed out where he was seating. She excused herself and took off across the lawn in high heels at a good clip. After sitting on the bench beside him, she placed her hand on his arm and engaged in conversation with him for a long time. The aide finally went to her and got her to come back and meet others. Her action was so moving, that most just stood silently and watched.

I have spent quite a bit of time on the Memorial Wall project. Carol's report will undoubtedly mention that the landscaping will be finished by month end. This August being the 65th anniversary of the end of the war, there will be commemoration events held in Ottawa. The plan is to have a wreath laying ceremony at the Memorial Wall. I am in constant touch with Veterans Affairs, and will be submitting details of the V-J Day weekend commemorations for posting on our web site and directly to the regions, as they become known to me. Hopefully we will be able to keep all informed by these actions.

VETERANS WITH A VISION

Recently I received a copy of a book, "Veterans With a Vision: Canada's war blinded in peace and in war". It was written by Serge Marc Durflinger, professor of history at the University of Ottawa. He has dedicated it to his grandmother, who was blind, and to our own Bill Mayne, Hong Kong

Veteran, ex-member of the Winnipeg Grenadiers.

It is the history of the efforts of war-blinded veterans in their attempts to gain recognition and compensation for their suffering. It traces their early efforts, sponsored by Sir Arthur Pearson, in setting up training facilities in England and in Canada, and resulting in the establishment of the Sir Arthur Pearson Association, linked to the Canadian National Institute for the Blind.

To me, sighted as I am, blindness is the most serious affliction that a person can endure, locked forever in a world of darkness. To me, there can be no greater debt owed to men and women who lost their sight in the service to their country. Bill Mayne was one of them, Louis Robertson was another, John Chatwell a third, names that readily come to mind, and there are others who fought at Hong Kong and spent their remaining years as blind men, with courage and determination surpassing all other attributes.

We who are in relatively good health in spite of advancing years can be thankful that we have retained the most precious of our senses, that of being able to see.

I checked out the availability of the book at Chapters-Indigo. The hard cover copy is a bit pricy, but the soft cover is available for \$19.76.

Veterans with a Vision, 358 pages, by Serge Marc Durflinger, ISBN 978-0-7748-1855-1.

No doubt that purchase of the book would help the efforts of SAPA and CNIB, and pay tribute to Comrade Bill Mayne, who had a large part in the success of the organizations.

AB/SK Action

Hello from Alberta!

We'd like to bring you up-to-date on some recent happenings involving some wonderful awareness of the Hong Kong story. Michael Palmer, the treasurer for the HKVCA AB/SK region and the grandson of George Thomas Palmer (Royal Rifles, Hong Kong vet) wrote a book entitled *Dark Side of the Sun* about his grandfather's experiences during WWII and it was recently released in early 2010. Since then, it's been in bookstores across Canada, it's been featured in a few newspapers across the country, and one of Michael's interviews about his book made it to a national CBC show (*The Story From Here*) back in April... aside from a few other regional CBC shows. Michael was also featured on the OMNI (catering to the Asian populations in Canada) National news telecast in May and his publisher, Borealis Press (www.borealispress.com) has since submitted his book for inclusion in the Governor General's Literary Awards.

He had his official book launch and lecture back on May 20th in the auditorium at the Calgary Military Museum and there was a good turn out. Lots of good food for the people who made it and we even had a Hong Kong vet who turned up - Ralph MacLean (Royal Rifles). Ralph was the celebrity that night it seems - there were some touching moments when he was acknowledged on a few occasions, on behalf of all the Hong Kong vets, for his service to Canada when he was fighting for survival and for freedom back in the hills of Hong Kong during the war. It was certainly wonderful to have him there so that he could see Michael's book come to fruition after many

years of research and writing (Ralph had helped a little bit with Michael's book during the research).

Since his book launch, Michael has completed a few more lectures on the Hong Kong story and book sales continue to be strong. In association with this, the committee heading up the Calgary Chinatown's Centennial celebration in August 2010 (they're expecting 50,000 people in attendance) is hoping to have the HKVCA AB/SK region at their event for promotional opportunities and for spreading awareness of the Hong Kong story.

Looking into the future, we're hoping to organize a HKVCA AB/SK dinner and dance around the time of Remembrance Day in November... it's still early in the planning phase but details will be provided when things unfold. That's it for now... have a great summer!

The Two-Day Event at First

Markham Place Mall: May 1st and 2nd

This has been a very active time for members of the Education Committee. On May 1st and 2nd, Bud and Ruth Mann, along with Royal Hong Kong Regiment President Tony Au, co-chaired a two-day event at First Markham Place Mall. With a large floor display borrowed from HKVCA in Winnipeg, we had a number of tables showing our books, pamphlets and information about our HKVCA Association, with pictures donated for the event by our resident HKVCA historian, Ken Skelton.

The event coincided with the opening of Asian Heritage Month on May 1st. Nancy Siew, who has chaired the AHM celebrations for many years was instrumental in arranging that the focus on this particular day very much included HKVCA. The lead-in to the event was a press conference on April 25th at the Bata Shoe Museum. Some of the volunteers who helped make the event itself such a success were the members of the Royal Hong Kong Regiment (RHKR) – Volunteers. They were able to connect with all those who frequent the Mall, including many more comfortable in Chinese than in English. Along with several HKVCA volunteers were a number of students from Milliken High School, with the support of History Head Paul Zimbalatti.

A large crowd gathered for the Grand Opening of Asian Heritage Month on the Saturday – and our own Association was very much in the forefront of the activity. Among the dignitaries were Senator Vivienne Poy, His Honour Lincoln Alexander, Mayor Scarpitti of Markham, along with two federal MPs, John Fletcher and John McCallum. George MacDonell was one of those who spoke at this very special opening, and it was Bud Mann who thanked the guest speakers. One highlight of the event was the presentation to our Association by the Mayor of Markham of a framed citation from the town of Markham.
