Great news!! Our project has been **approved** in principle by the National Capitol Commission (NCC). It will be done under **Parks Canada** and they are donating \$10,000 to the project. What a bonus!

Derrill Henderson, has had meetings with NCC to start the site selection process and to answer a few questions to clarify some things that the NCC Board had. We have been able to move our completion date to **August, 2009**. Once the site has been selected the preparation work can begin. **The bottom line is - we are on our way.**

More good news from the **Winnipeg Foundation**, they are donating \$5,000 to our project. Wow!! Keep it coming. There were other companies and foundations that were waiting for the approval, so now we will be contacting them to see what that will realize.

Say "Thank you" to each soldier (Air Force & Navy included) you meet. Take every opportunity to stand and pay your respect when the cortège of one fallen in battle goes by. Support the widows and children. Wave a Canadian flag!

Two recent media articles, one written by an Australian and another by a Brit, lash out at the nations of the worlds for condemning our military actions or what they perceive to be a lack of them. These two articles highlight all our accomplishments and they challenge any other nation to put their record against Canada. For so few people, we have accomplished so much.

In the fall of 2007, a nation wide survey was conducted to see if, and how much, Canadians appreciate veterans' sacrifices. Eight in ten Canadians said they are proud of Canada's military and the role they played in world conflicts of the past and what they are doing today. In Quebec, often erroneously condemned for a negative view on our military, more than 70% stated they were proud of Canada's military. Over 80% of Canadians wear poppies. The problem with Canadians is that they don't know very much of Canada's war history. **This is where our Association must take a leading role.** I am proud to say that our Ontario Region has created the educational model for all to follow. By educating Canada's youth on what we know best - the Battle of Hong Kong and the Far East POW experience, we may well spur others to promote a wider base knowledge.

Veteran's Issues: The Lawsuit brought against the government by families of veterans because they felt that the government did not handle the funds of veterans hospitalized for shell-shock and/or schizophrenic conditions, has been dismissed by the Supreme Court. If successful, it would have seen millions of dollars paid to "thousands of distant relatives and perhaps even creditors" of these veterans. My question is: "Where were they when the veterans needed them?" Lawyers for the veteran's families are deciding whether anything can be

"salvaged". There is a possibility of payment to veterans still alive or later to their widows, but the buck should stop there.

The new pension rates have been published. Anyone with questions may contact their local VAC office, or contact me if this is more 'comfortable' for them.

On a more personal note, I continue to represent our Association at every opportunity. I attend a minimum of three events a month. I receive many questions from those doing research or just having an interest in what our veterans experienced in Hong Kong and Japan. When I have the information, I answer them, but mostly I put them in contact with the HK vet best suited to answer their queries. For the most part, they are envious of the dedication and camaraderie of our Association. You are the ones that make this possible. Thank you.

CAMPBELLTON PLAQUE

On the evening of December 8, the City of Campbellton unveiled a plaque in the Civic Centre Park, dedicated to the memory of Hong Kong Veterans. It was a chilly evening, but that didn't prevent a huge crowd from attending the outdoor ceremony. It was a testimony to the respect for HK Vets that the people of the area hold. A copy of the plaque will appear on the HKVCA web site, as well as a copy of the proclamation by Campbellton which reads in part,

"THEREFORE, I, Mark Ramsay, Mayor of the City of Campbellton, do hereby proclaim the month of December, 2007 as 'Hong Kong Veterans Month' in the City of Campbellton".

I have written a letter of thanks to the Mayor and Counsellors.

Campbellton was well represented in the Royal Rifles, but with the passing of Reggie Law, no HK Vets are left there now, although we still have Graham Boudreau, Henry Lyons and Allison Pollock living in the Campbellton area.

Nathan Greenfield

Some time ago we received a request from Nathan Greenfield, the author of several books on Canada's role in various world conflicts.

Greenfield has recently been in the Gaspé area, interviewing as many of those of us who are left, collecting material for another book on the Canadians in Hong Kong. He visited me on a snowy day and stayed for two and a half hours. Veterans Ombudsman

Minister Thompson has established the Office of the Veterans Ombudsman. Pat B. Stogan MSC, CD, PEng, Colonel (Ret) has been appointed to fill this position.

Veteran's groups were invited to attend a meeting with Col. Stogan. I attended representing both the HKVA and the HKVCA. It was a session intended to introduce himself to those gathered; to supply information on how he envisioned his office operating; and to give all an opportunity to discuss their concerns. Despite a snowstorm, there was a good turnout of associations. His Operating Philosophy is: **"It may be right, it may be legal, but is it fair?"**

He outlined the structure of this new organization and how he proposes it to operate. He emphasized that questions or issues coming to him from any veteran will be given full consideration. His role will concentrate on correcting the processes and/or interpretation applied by the Pensions & Benefits department of VAC, the Veterans Review and Appeal Board, DND, and other agencies/departments wherever veteran's issues arise. His office will not become involved in the actual processing of the veteran's case, but it will ensure that a fair and just system is used in arriving at decisions. I expressed our concerns with widow's benefits and the process by which the proposals of his office are implemented.

He encouraged all to keep abreast of the progress of his Office and on behalf of our HK veterans and their widows, I intend to do just that!

HKVCA and Tax Receipts

Perhaps you aren't aware that the Hong Kong Veterans' Commemorative Association is a Registered Charity in Canada and as such, can issue tax receipts just like any other charity.

The HKVCA was issued a charity designation by Canada Revenue Agency in 2002 and is permitted to issue receipts that can be used as tax deductions on your

income tax return. This is no different than any of the many charities which most of you support and while we are not suggesting that you don't donate to them, we are asking that you include the HKVCA in your charitable donations.

The HKVCA will issue you a tax receipt for any donation of \$20.00 or more. If you wish, you may specify that it be directed to the Memorial Wall project but our activities are not limited to that. Any donation which is not specified or is marked 'General' will be utilized in one of the many other projects we have underway in education, promotion, history and general public awareness.

So, we encourage you to consider the HKVCA when allocating your charitable donations. We will promptly issue you a tax receipt which you can include in your annual income tax return. Support our cause while at the same time easing that painful tax bite.

Apple for the Teacher

Ontario Education Committee Report - Pat Turcotte, Chair

Contact information is now being received from the veterans following the letter sent by Diana Taschereau to all Ontario Region Hong Kong veterans. The veterans had been asked to confirm their contact person in case Ontario Region needs to get in touch with someone who can act as the contact for the veteran. Thirteen of the 30 veterans have responded to Pat Turcotte at this juncture as the letter had requested. Hopefully, the remaining veterans will be in touch before long. Many thanks to Diana for taking on this task.

Cheryl Petherick, a High School History teacher in Courtice, ON has been working at searching out for us possible workshops involving Hong Kong veterans and members of the Education Committee. The object is to promote awareness of the Hong Kong story, and the Ten Lessons so closely tied to that story. Cheryl has contacted 7 Universities and 12 Ontario School Boards in that regard, and we're hoping to have several workshops before the end of

the school year. We thank Cheryl for her efforts in this very important area.

The HKVCA Cross-Canada Essay Contest judges who have agreed to be involved this year include Nancy Hamer Strahl, Cheryl Petherick, Mike Babin, Bernard Turcotte and myself. Since the May 9th deadline for entries is much later than last year's March 15th, students will have more time to prepare their material. If you can, wherever you live across the country, encourage teachers to have their students participate in the contest. It will be a great learning situation for them, with the bonus of cash prizes. See the HKVCA Website for details of the contest.

Jim Trick, our Webmaster, and I have been discussing the Teachers' Zone on the HKVCA Website. He has asked me to work as the Editor, and expand the information available there. I will be in touch with each of the Regional Directors across the country to search out a person in each Region who can keep us informed about HK activities in the schools and/or the communities.

In our own Region, congratulations are in order for the hiring of Sue Beard, an expert in graphic design who has been asked by Mike Babin to work on materials related to presentations about Hong Kong in the schools, in particular multimedia tools, and what are called "Seminars in a box". The object is to make it possible for interested HKVCA members in every region to participate in increasing the awareness of students and adults in their communities about the Battle of Hong Kong and the contribution and sacrifices made by our Canadian soldiers in the Second World War.

Manitoba Education Committee Report – Carol Hadley, Chair

In October 2007, the Manitoba Region Education Committee received their new tabletop display for use in schools and other small settings thanks to a generous donation from the Winnipeg Foundation. It debuted at the HKVA Reunion Dinner but

was used, the first time, at the Manitoba Teachers Conference that was held at the end of November. Teachers from all over Manitoba viewed our display and received information about our Association. We also held 2 presentations in a classroom format where about 24 teachers were introduced to the 10 Lessons through a PowerPoint session, received a package of information to be used in the classroom and encouraged to have their students do a project for the Ontario Region Essay Contest.

Our Region will be attending the Heritage Days Symposium held at the University of Winnipeg in May where about 500 students, parents and teachers will be viewing all the displays, receiving information about our Association and participating in a scavenger hunt where the students need to answer questions from the displays to win a prize.

We have recently met with Executive members of the Winnipeg Chinese Cultural and Community Centre, Dr J. Du, President and Mr. P. Lee, Vice President, to discuss areas where we might share information about the Battle of Hong Kong. They expressed an interest in our VJ Day service and we may be able to set up our display at their Centre, possibly during Folklorama. In the meantime we look forward to exploring other ideas with them.

Hong Kong Veterans Remembered

On December 4, 2007, the Oshawa Central Collegiate Institute (OCCI) unveiled a granite plaque commemorating the lives of nine Hong Kong Veterans. The plaque is prominently displayed in the main hallway of the school.

The nine veterans, Jack Arthur, Edward Bolton, Henry Galbraith, William Lee, Edward Lott, Jeffrey Marston, Fredrick Mason and Mathew Murray, all called Oshawa home and raised their families in the city just east of Toronto upon their return to Canada.

The unveiling of the plaque was part of a larger project organized and run by Ms Flora Fung, a Grade 10 History Teacher at OCCI. With her advisor and our ardent supporter, Nancy Hamer Strahl, she put in place a series of events and strategies that honoured the soldiers who fought in the Battle of Hong Kong in 1941, paying particular attention to the nine Hong Kong soldiers who were from the Oshawa area.

As Flora wrote, "In the school year of 2007-2008, Oshawa Central Collegiate formally adopted the veterans who fought in the Battle for Hong Kong. This project is special for two reasons; one because Oshawa Central Collegiate is located in the neighborhood where many of these Oshawa men lived and raised their families after their return from the Asia and secondly my family is of Hong Kong descent, which makes this project one of personal significance for me."

In November of 2007, Grade 10 history students received a biography of a Hong Kong veteran who fought in the Battle for Hong Kong. Their Individual Study Unit (ISU) was to create a tribute to their soldier.

The remembrance reception was held at Oshawa Central Collegiate to remember the contribution of these men. In addition to the plaque, the ISU presentations of all the students were on display. It was an amazing sight to see the care and imagination the students put into their tributes. From narratives and photos to dioramas and sculptures and multimedia presentations, it was evident that the students took

great pride in producing their moving tributes.

Representing the Hong Kong Veterans at the unveiling was Robert "Flash" Clayton and his always charming wife, Jessie. Flash was visibly moved by the ceremony and the project as he thanked the students on behalf of all veterans for their tribute. As well, several members of the Honoured Veterans' families were in attendance, including Mrs. Mathew (Audrey) Murray.

Other honoured guests included, Senator Vivienne Poy of the Canadian Government, Mike Babin, Regional Director for the HKVCA in Ontario, our former Regional Director - Pat Turcotte and myself.

The Memorial Wall project certainly has given the HKVCA a different dimension as far as finances are concerned and I'm delighted to handle much larger sums of money which have been flowing in as donations. Our Association has invested in a number of other projects as part of our ongoing effort to spread the word. For example, the Manitoba Region has recently had two handsome displays made which tell the story of the Battle of Hong Kong in pictures and other graphics. One is a free standing display which we place in strategic locations for a few weeks at a time. The other is a table top exhibit which we use as a visual display when we give lectures to groups of schoolchildren, teachers, and others. Major contributors to the cost of having these displays made were the Winnipeg Foundation and the Thomas Sill Foundation. We appreciate their generosity and

recognize their significant role in our community.

A similar exercise is currently being carried out by the Ontario Region. In this case, it was Veterans Affairs Canada that provided a grant to have a comprehensive exhibit made which could be used in a variety of ways to tell the Hong Kong story. A design consultant has been hired and an advisory committee formed to research and then present our story in a meaningful way.

A recent addition to our items for sale is an Honour Roll, in colour, of those who were members of 'C' Force Headquarters Unit in Hong Kong in 1941. We also have redone the Honour Roll for the Winnipeg Grenadiers in colour and each of these attractive scrolls can be purchased for \$20.00 plus postage.

When telling our story to school teachers, we can suggest they purchase teaching guides from us called the Ten Lessons. We can supply these excellent historical accounts of the Battle of Hong Kong in both English and French at very reasonable prices.

I would like to remind everyone that we have a variety of items for sale that are most suitable as gifts to members of the Hong Kong family.
